

Dear Friends

I thought I would take this opportunity to update you on the discussions that have been taking place with regard to the possibility of the three circuits; Gosport & Fareham, Petersfield Liphook & Haslemere (PLH) and Portsmouth, joining together in a new circuit.

Superintendents, Circuit Staff and Circuit Leadership Teams have been meeting together in various formations for some time. About 6 months ago we set up a Joint Circuits Working Party made up of 1 ordained and 1 lay person from each circuit to look more closely at the implications and process. Rev. Stephen Wright and Nigel Cox have been representing our circuit.

In September, all three Circuit Leadership Teams were in agreement that we should move on to the next stage in the process where we informed the District and requested their participation. On the same day, all three circuits sent emails (with the prescribed wording) to Andrew Wood, our District Chair.

"The Circuit Leadership Team of the Gosport & Fareham Circuit invites the District Policy Executive to start a consultation under Standing Order 501(3) regarding the formation of a new circuit comprising of the present Portsmouth; Petersfield, Liphook & Haslemere; and Gosport & Fareham Circuits in September 2013".

Since then, the Circuit Leadership Teams have been in negotiations with Matthew Read (District Development Enabler) to develop a programme of information and discussion around the circuits. The key points are as follows....

January 2013	Various Information/discussion meetings held around the circuit to ascertain opinion.
14th February 2013	NB—NEW date for Circuit Meeting Decision about joining circuits to be made.
5th March 2013	District Policy Executive meet to consider and circuit requests.
4th –11th July 2013	Methodist Conference meets in London to consider any District Requests.

I would ask you all to think and pray about the future developments for our circuit and be prepared to take an active part in the process we have set before us.

PASTORAL CARE AT FAREHAM METHODIST CHURCH

Within the life of the Church the role of the Pastoral Visitor is one of the most significant. Its importance has several facets, because the visitor is part of the structure of the Church which enables members and adherents to sense that they belong to a Christian community. Hence, part of the responsibility is to be a channel of communication, linking people together and keeping them in touch with what is happening in the life of the Church.

The Pastoral Visitor is also significant in providing pastoral care to one or more individuals (their pastoral group), by demonstrating an interest in their lives and providing support and encouragement at particular times of need. As a member of a wider team, visitors can offer not just their own time, skills and resources, but those of the Church as a body. The visitor also has a role to play in assisting others to grow in their faith and discipleship, through listening to their experience, discussing concerns and providing encouragement.

With a Church the size of Fareham Methodist Church, the pastoral care can only be effective if there is a strong sense of teamwork and appropriate support for the work. To enable this to happen Pastoral Visitors are seen as a team. It is expected that the team will meet together every six months to share experiences and information and to support each other. The Pastoral Secretary is the first line of support for the Pastoral Visitors, the one from whom they should request assistance and to whom they should report any changes in the circumstances of the members of their pastoral group. However, the Minister is also available to assist visitors.

The Pastoral Visitors, Pastoral Secretary and the Minister together form the Church's Pastoral Committee, which is responsible to the Church Council for the provision of pastoral care within Fareham Methodist Church. The committee's role is to organize the members and adherents into pastoral groups and allocate visitors, provide appropriate support and training for all those involved in pastoral care and develop strategies for the work. All the Pastoral Visitors should meet together with the Minister and Pastoral Secretary twice a year.

The Role of Pastoral Visitors

- To keep in contact with the members of their pastoral group through home visits and telephone conversations, ensuring that their personal details on the Church's data base are kept up-to-date, and informing the Pastoral Secretary of any changes.
- To distribute the annual Methodist Church Membership Tickets to the members in their pastoral group.
- To distribute Church Newsletters and other information to those in their group unable to attend worship regularly.
- To offer support and encouragement to the members and adherents in their pastoral group, particularly in times of special need.
- To supply news about those in their pastoral group for inclusion in the Church Newsletters.
- To advise their Pastoral Secretary or Minister when additional support might be appropriately provided by the Church or the Minister


Remembrance

A number of years ago Jeremy Clarkson from Top Gear, presented a documentary, 'The Victoria Cross: For Valour'. This told the stories of some VC heroes, including his own father-in-law, who he never knew. Moved by these stories, Clarkson went on to ask, 'How can we call the likes of David Beckham a hero for scoring a goal? I wonder who your heroes are today?'

In this season of remembrance we think especially of those who have sacrificed their lives in war. However, Jesus calls us all to a radical and supernatural heroism when he says, 'You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven.' (Matt 5:43-45).

God calls us to love even those we regard as our enemies. It's easy to love those we get on with or find attractive. The love of which Jesus speaks, as throughout the New Testament, is agape love. This quality of love seeks and works only for the good of the other person. When we can pray for someone we don't get on with, God begins to answer your prayer by softening our attitude toward them. We love them because they are individuals created in the image of God and in need of God's forgiveness and grace, just like us.

This month marks the 25th anniversary of the Enniskillen bombing in Northern Ireland on 8th November 1987. An IRA bomb exploded during a Remembrance Day service, resulting in 11 people being killed and 63 injured. What is remembered most from this day is the interview Gordon Wilson gave only hours after the bombing. It brought him to international prominence, as he described the conversation with his dying daughter Marie, as they lay buried in rubble. To the astonishment of listeners, Wilson went on to say, 'But I bear no ill will. I bear no grudge... She's in heaven and we shall meet again. I will pray for these men tonight and every night.' The impact of his words lay in his willingness to forgive the bombers, and as a result Wilson went on to dedicate his life as a campaigner for peace and reconciliation. He perfectly models Jesus words for us. 'No words in more than twenty-five years of violence in Northern Ireland had such a powerful, emotional impact.' (Jonathan Bardon).

PLAGUE OF PLASTIC BAGS

A total of eight billion plastic bags were given out by supermarkets in the UK last year. That was nearly 400 million more carrier bags than in 2010, despite promises from retailers to cut down. At present, the average number of plastic bags in every home in England stands at 17. Nine out of ten of us reuse the bags, either for shopping or for bin bags.

Research from Wrap, a waste reduction agency, and Which? Magazine, suggests that more than half of us would be happy to pay 5p per bag, as they do in Wales, where some retailers have been able to cut the number of bags they give out by up to 80 per cent.

HAPPY 1st BIRTHDAY

One year ago, *Singing the Faith* was published: a collection of 840 hymns and songs, that would take an estimated forty hours to sing from beginning to end.

The collection was published by Hymns Ancient and Modern on behalf of the Methodist Church, after seven years of deliberation, theological scrutiny, musical collaboration and editing. To date, nearly 98,000 copies have been sold across all the published editions.



Peter Brophy, who was Editor-in-Chief of *Singing the Faith*, said: "Having completed the editorial tasks for '*Singing the Faith*' it was first of all a delight to handle the published book - all those scraps of paper, urgent emails and even more urgent phone calls now transformed into a hymnbook - a physical testament to the dedicated volunteers who worked for a Biblical seven years to bring it to fruition.

"But it has been even more of a delight to visit Methodist churches from Cornwall to Berwick-on-Tweed and from London to Lancashire during the last twelve months and be handed a copy of 'our new hymnbook' by the steward at the entrance, and then to join in worship, whether traditional or modern, using what I truly believe is a precious resource given to us by God."

The Revd Barbara Bircumshaw, Chair of the Music Resources Group which was responsible for producing the collection, said: "I am thrilled by the success of *Singing the Faith*. It's great that it is being widely used by congregations around the Connexion - more than I ever dreamed possible. And it's very humbling to have played a part in bringing *Singing the Faith* to birth! I pray that it will be a valuable tool for worship and witness, for glorifying God and sharing the Gospel in the twenty first century."

In response to huge demand, a special one-off printing of an organ edition was organised, and a Braille version of the collection is being developed in partnership with the Torch Trust.

THE BUZZARD, THE BAT, AND THE BUMBLE BEE

It never sees the means of escape at the top, but persists in trying to find some way out through the sides near the bottom. It will seek a way where none exists, until it completely destroys itself.




★ JESUS IS COMING! ★

St HILDA

St Hilda was born a princess on November 17th 614 and was christened at the age of 13 with her uncle, King Edwin of Northumbria. When she was 33 she became a nun and in time she became the abbess (or leader) of a double monastery (where both monks and nuns lived) at Whitby in Yorkshire. And it was at Whitby, under St Hilda's leadership, that a famous conference was held to decide the date of Easter.



You know that Easter falls on a different day each year, but do you know that at that time the Celtic churches (in Ireland, Scotland and some of England) used a different way to the Roman Church (in the rest of England and Rome) to work out the date. The debate went on until finally it was decided that everyone would follow the Roman pattern.
