For each day of the month there are prayers old and new with illustrations that connect us with God but also with each other in the worldwide Methodist Church.

Each year there is a theme and for the coming year, which begins in September, the chosen theme is 'Responding to the Gospel'. I would really recommend it as a great resource which has something for everyone.

If we are to respond to the gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ, then we need to live a balanced life of being and doing, of thought and action, of word and deed. Times of prayer, quiet and reflection give us the energy to live out our faith and make God's love known in our community and in the world.

May God richly bless each one of us as we seek to follow Jesus Christ.

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MARMITE SOLDIERS

A jar of Marmite landed on the table in front of me, placed there by Mrs White. "What is that for?" I asked, "is Marmite one of John's favourites?"

After the boys had left the marquee, John's soldiers were still on the table. By suppertime that day, John had not eaten a single soldier, and had told me that he did not want any more soldiers.

When we arrived home again John must have told his mother about his decision to try other food. "How did you manage to get John to eat food other than marmite soldiers?" she asked.

"It was nothing to do with the staff", I said. "It was his tent mates. He wanted to try what the other boys were eating." I said to her. "I rather think that God was with us in camp, just as He always is. He put the words into John's tent companions' mouths, which gave John the courage to try what everybody else was eating".
