I would like to pass on thanks to everyone who has contributed to the Basics Bank this last year. When Jill and I delivered the last contribution collected between Thursday 15th and Sunday 18th we were given some information by Phil Rutt (who organises the collection and distribution). In 2022 an average of 140 families were supported every week with 261 being helped in one week at the beginning of December.

Your contribution was a superb effort which was photographed after we loaded it into the car.

Dear Jill

It has been a little while since our last update and much has happened in the villages of Transcarpathia and the Kherson region of Ukraine.

The following are just some of the hardships faced and ways in which we have been able to support those most in need.

Transcarpathia

In October villagers woke to multiple fires in the village of Gyula following an arson attack.

Eight residents' homes and the church bell tower were targeted by a lone man, whose motives still remain unclear. With the onset of winter months this was a devastating blow to a community which was already suffering from the huge increase in food and fuel costs and the departure of many of the men in the villages to avoid the war.

Ukraine's main power operator announced recently that it has applied emergency shutdowns throughout the entire country due to a rapidly increasing power deficit following the many Russian air strikes.

These shutdowns have lasted as long as **16 hours a day**, plunging villages into darkness and shutting off mains supplied heating.

We are working with our trusted contacts to ensure that funding is provided to purchase backup generators to create places of warmth that people can go to - at the time of typing this email temperatures are currently -3°C but can reach -30°C in January.

Kherson

Since the Russian withdrawal from Kherson, the region has come under heavy bombardment from shelling and artillery attacks, cutting off power and water supplies and damaging houses at random on a daily basis creating huge uncertainty and fear.

The situation in the region is desperate, food and hygiene supplies are difficult to source, and many are forced to walk to the river for water.

However, the incredible team behind The Cooks Project continues to work tirelessly to ensure as many people as possible receive a hot meal - coming up with creative ways to ensure food is prepared, cooked, and distributed safely - even during the power-cuts.











Due to the lack of internet coverage, communication is incredibly difficult, but we continue to work closely with The Kherson Initiative to ensure that your donations are getting to those who are in great need of support. We are also supporting orphanages and those with medical needs who need special supplies as much as we can.

Please visit our <u>website</u> for ways in which you can help. Our trustees are volunteers, as are our partners on the ground, and we can guarantee that **100%** of any donations given can go to support the people in need.

Family Matters Report for November 2022

Family confidentiality

FM is contracted to protect the privacy of the Family. We hope you appreciate this can restrict the information we are able to provide you on the circumstances of the Family we are supporting. Please help us in this by showing caution in discussing details of the Family with others.

Welcome and Welfare

The family are by nature both independent and industrious. They arrived in this country with a hugely positive attitude. It has been surprising to us to see how ready and eager they are to use these qualities to settle into UK life.

The Team had volunteers to help the family with various activities such as shopping, using public transport and getting to know the area. Right from the start the family were proactive and after a few trips around the area they were keen to shop and explore independently.

They use Apps to navigate and tend to walk or cycle to avoid transport costs whenever possible.

They have met with neighbours and joined in with the street celebrations for the Queen's Jubilee in June. Some of the local youngsters now come and ask if the 'boys' (all in their 20's) will come out to play football!

Family members have been introduced to different groups and activities to help them integrate. As we continue to support their independence and integration within the local community, we focus upon their aspirations, seeking appropriate support.

Housing

The purchase and refurbishment of a suitable house by a group of ethical Investors has enabled the Family to have a good quality property at a rent well below market value and be assured that they will be able to rent this house for at least two years.

A six-month inspection was carried out in October to check if there were any problems. Only a few minor maintenance tasks were necessary. The family appreciate the house and are proud to live there and it does not surprise us that they are model tenants.

The investment group that purchased the house continue to build a fund to cover any unforeseen repairs or maintenance as deemed necessary. FM continue to be thankful to these investors for the affordable rental home they provide the Family.

Work and Benefits

Understandably the Family members were not able to seek work immediately as their English was insufficient and they also needed time to establish themselves here in the UK. FM supported them to apply for and receive the Universal Credit payments that they were rightfully due.

The three sons, all young men in their twenties, came with far more English than we expected. They had a strong desire to work, to help support the Family and to cease receiving benefits. Since June all three have been in full time employment. FM will work with all three to give them the knowledge they need to be able to consider their further education and training opportunities. However, it is important we always remember that ultimately it is their decision as to what course of action they take at any point in time.

The father had an extensive range of previous employment experience. He cannot realistically slot back into these sorts of roles until he improves his language skills. In the meantime, he could use his exceptional wood working skills on such things as commissions for building a variety of replica wooden models. His talent at this seems almost endless!

The mother had teaching experience amongst other skills. She might eventually wish to seek employment in primary school teaching. Whilst she improves her language skills, we are seeking appropriate opportunities for her to gain experience in the UK education sector.

Language development

It was not possible to enrol any of the Family for extensive formal ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) education until new classes started in September. In the interim FM ensured either both temporary formal and informal ESOL education was provided to all Family members. Since September the mother and father are doing an average of twelve hours a week at Highbury College in Portsmouth. The youngest son has received some ESOL education at Fareham College. At present all three sons employment hours mean they cannot realistically attend ESOL classes, but their English capabilities are growing without this.

Integration planning

Correct support leads family members to be as independent as possible whilst only intervening where necessary. The qualities of the family mean progress towards independence is quicker than we would have expected. Our task is to build up our skills in this unfamiliar process whilst allowing the family members to fully utilise their abilities!

Health

The Family are all enrolled with a local doctor's practice, but we have failed to find an NHS dentist with whom to enrol family members!

Any pointers in securing NHS dental registrations would be hugely appreciated.

Finance

Thanks to the excellent start we were given by many personal donations and donations from several of the Church communities in Fareham, we began this project on a healthy financial footing. This has been supplemented by ongoing donations from the Churches and several fundraising events undertaken prior to the family's arrival. We now have in hand sufficient money for our anticipated needs. FMF gives a huge 'Thank You' to all our benefactors over the past 3 years.

In conclusion

The ongoing settlement and integration of the family has been a positive experience for all involved – Core Group, Volunteers and, most importantly, the family themselves. Our whole team have repeatedly reported what a pleasure it is to meet and work with the family. It is particularly gratifying to see them begin to integrate both into UK society generally and to develop relationships in the neighbourhood. We give thanks to God for the grace he has bestowed on our work and for the prayers, support and assistance provided to us by CTiF members and local Churches.


