

Dear Friends,



The eighteenth century atheist Voltaire said that Christianity would die out within a hundred years. Today his house belongs to the French Bible Society, which sends out tens of thousands

of Bibles all over the world every year.

At the Southampton District Synod, which we hosted at Bay House School, two items grabbed my attention to the point where I felt I had to follow them up in our Church and Circuit.

The first was an address by Rev. Dr. Mark Wakelin (a member of the Connexional Team). He was invited to speak about a new Methodist publication called "*Discipleship… and the people called Methodists*" by Rev Martyn Atkins (General Secretary of the Methodist Church in Britain). The one thing that came over to me, as clear as a bell, from what Mark said was; "*Discipleship starts with the deepening of spirituality*".

The second item from Synod, seemed to dovetail in with the first. It was yet another initiative from the Methodist Connexion which is supported by most of the other mainstream denominations,



called "**Biblefresh**". Now I get a bit irritated by the number of "initiatives" that our church constantly throws at us (that's another story!), but I think we should sit up and listen to this one. If you go to the website;

<u>www.deepeningdiscipleship.org.uk</u> you can sign up to receive email information. On the website there is further information that I have printed below...

"Throughout 2011 the Methodist Church is encouraging churches and individuals to deepen their discipleship by focusing on the Bible. This particular year marks the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible which brought the Scripture to people in English and, when read aloud, had a dramatic effect on church attendance and people's lives.

What better opportunity then to **celebrate** Scripture as a gift from God and take up the challenge of encouraging people to engaging with it in fresh, life-changing ways to become effective disciples of Jesus Christ in the 21st century. We want people to live Bible lives with confidence and compassion in their relationships, workplaces and communities.

This focus on the Bible is a starting point for becoming more serious about our discipleship and reminding us of our roots as a disciple-

making movement. John Wesley said we were raised up by God to bring 'Scriptural Holiness' to the land. We want to learn how to do this in ways that deepen our love of God and neighbour and make the Bible more accessible to others."

I have ordered 50 copies of Martyn Atkins booklet from MPH – so please ask me for a copy! (they're free but you will need to pay $\pounds 2.50$ postage if you want to order more)

How about taking up the challenge for 2011

- To get every member and adherent into a regular Bible Study group.
- To encourage new ways using our Bibles every day, eg – as a focus for our prayer – how about our own bible/prayer leaflet / handbook ?).



- To offer courses in Bible study.
- To encourage a Biblical focus to our creative skills in art, music, dance, drama, computer presentations, photography, video, etc..

HAITI: Update

It is now over four months since a 7.0 magnitude earthquake struck Haiti, causing unprecedented amounts of destruction, leaving some 230,000 people dead and over a million homeless.

The days (and indeed the months) following the earthquake were a very busy time for Tom Quenet, partnership coordinator for the Caribbean and the Americas. "For the last three and a half months, it has felt as if I've had to do one and half jobs with extra administration and coordinating the support for Haiti" Tom says.

Tom recently visited Haiti, and his assessment of the situation there is that it is chaotic, although a lot is being done. "They are slowly trying to recover the education and health services, and the infrastructure," he says. "There are sanitation issues because the water is muddy and dirty. Working out how best to make use of the aid sent can be very difficult, especially in a society that does not work well."

SO FAR THE METHODIST APPEAL FOR HAITI HAS RAISED MORE THAN £850,000.

 $\pm 100,000$ of that was used immediately for First Aid, medicine and food. Some of it went towards the purchase of six marquee tents which are now serving as temporary classrooms and towards paying teachers' and pastors salaries.

THERE IS STILL A LOT MORE WORK THAT NEEDS TO BE DONE IN ORDER TO RESTORE LIFE IN HAITI TO NORMAL.

Donations to "*The Methodist Church World Mission Fund*" (*Haiti Appeal*) will be gratefully received.



THE LONG WALK – ACHIEVED! Finale to the July / August and September articles

Well, those of you who were in Church last Sunday will know that, like the proverbial bad penny, I've turned up. The rest of you will realise on reading this.

Apart from the Satellite Navigation receiver packing up on the third day in horrendous wet weather conditions, never to display a map again, and me overbalancing face down into a beck just below a waterfall (very refreshing) taking out permanently my camera, mobile 'phone and spectacles, on the fourth day, the journey was relatively uneventful.

Garry did her best to sabotage the event by badly spraining her ankle and pulling ankle ligaments whilst on a short walk around Ullswater on the fourth day. As she and Barbara were the backup team it was essential that she could at least drive the car from place to place and she struggled on bravely. Selfish me, I didn't want her to go to a hospital in case they found something broken and insisted on us abandoning: there was too much at stake. After the best part of another week it was checked, in Harrogate, and I breathed a sigh of relief.

There were no easy days, just varying degrees of difficulty whether steep ascents, with or without rain water cascading down what was thought to be the path or, worse, descents, walking from boulder to boulder, sliding on scree, scrambling up and down muddy and rock strewn uneven paths barely the width of one's foot and howling winds doing their utmost to blow us off the narrow paths and down the steep gorges into more becks..... However, the worst conditions were mile after mile of peat bog at 'Nine Standards Rigg' where it was common-place to find ourselves up to our calves in bog and occasionally above our knees. With poor indications of where the paths were, particularly in Cumbria, there was much potential danger particularly without the reassurance of knowing our position. When the visibility is good the navigation is less important; when it's bad it is important but there are no features to observe and we had to rely on estimation of speed based on previous experience.

The above is just a 'taster', I'll not bore you with more detail; I've yet to write up my notes. Suffice to say that we completed the journey at 1600 on Tuesday 21 September, on schedule, and were greeted by Garry, Barbara and John's brother, Pete, who had driven over from Harrogate.

After the ceremonial 'walking into the North Sea' and 'throwing in the pebble from the Irish Sea', Garry broke open the champagne which we shared with another John, whom we'd met up with on a few days of the walk, and his wife, Carol.

I thought of you all on several occasions, particularly on Sundays and Thursdays, though the concentration required left little prolonged thinking time. I know that your thoughts and prayers were with us and would like to take this formal opportunity to thank you for all your support for which I am very grateful.

I now have the task of collecting the donations pledged, so will then have the opportunity to try to answer any questions.

MORE MEMORIES ... ACCESS TO CHURCH HALLS

So many alterations have been made to the Church buildings over the past 30 years that it is difficult for me to recall fully what the layout of the buildings were when I arrived in Fareham in 1965. But my memory was jogged the other day when I was asked about the original access to our halls.

Then, as now, the only door for key holders was the "back door", originally in King's Road roughly opposite the entry from vestry to Church. To the left was the vestry, (long since removed) to the right the choir vestry (now the Ministers's vestry), ahead the door into Church. There was no access to the halls except through the choir vestry into the present passage. The main door to the Church in Queen's was of the pushbar emergency exit type; to the right was the ladies toilet, ahead 2 doors to the Church, to the left the gentlemen's toilet. Again, no access to the halls, except through the Church.

It would thus appear that the halls (there were 3 then) were for Church use only. When Margaret Outten began Mini Market the public were admitted to the large hall via the emergency exit, where the play school entrance is now. We have certainly become more aware of our place in the community over these past 30 years. Is my memory correct?

The choice that we face is quite simple The rewards plain for all men to see As you did all of this to my brother Then said Jesus, you did it to me.





ALL HALLOWS EVE

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1 November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was

popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

> Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.
