## April 2011

Dear Friends,

*"Thy will be done"* are four very familiar words from our Lord's Prayer. Words which we often say before we put our minds in gear. Words which, if we really think about them and understand their true significance we might



find difficult to say and really mean! – What would happen if God really took us up on them!

During this time of Lent we have the opportunity to meditate on the condition of our Christian pilgrimage and how we can remove those things which get in the way of our relationship with God. To do that we need to discover in more detail what it is that is God's will for us.

"Much of the time God's will for us is clear. Jesus calls us to be alert to the needs of our neighbours, generous in our estimate of others, quick to forgive. He calls us to accept life as a gift from God, to take any knocks along the way as part of its "rich tapestry", and to live in a manner which commends our faith to those around us. This is the way of life to which we pledge ourselves, every time we pray the Lord's Prayer." (Rev. Cannon John Young)

Sometimes, however, God's will for us may be complicated and we find ourselves in situations which are morally ambiguous. Should I drop everything when the old lady down the road rings in apparent distress? – Well of course I should. But what if it means cancelling a meeting which has involved others in travel? What should I do then? All of us face tensions of this kind from time to time. Sometimes our society as a whole faces these dilemmas – should we encourage stem-cell research? – should we legalise euthanasia or assisted suicide?

John Wesley in 1766 put forward the idea of "*Christian perfection*", a moment in the life of a Christian at which the healing power of the Holy Spirit results in a "*perfection in love*" which means that at least at that moment one is being motivated wholly by love of God. This means that, at this time, through the power of the Holy Spirit we are truly able to discern God's will for us.

For most of us, day by day, our simple concern is to be more like

## MOTHERING SUNDAY 4th SUNDAY IN LENT

There is an old Jewish saying:

God could not be everywhere, And therefore He made mothers.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families - which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called Simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed and in many ways now resembles the American Mothers' Day, with families going out to Sunday Lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

## THE HANDWRITTEN BIBLE PROJECT

As part of our Methodist celebration of the 400th Anniversary of the King James Bible and the Biblefresh initiative, Conference 2010 resolved that the Districts would work collectively to handwrite the Bible during the course of 2011. This will be done using re-cycled paper, and with encouragement to express maximum creativity, and cultural diversity to create a 'Bible of the people'.

The hand transcription will take place in the Districts between January and the end of May 2011 during the first half of the Methodist Year of the Bible. Each District will present their handwritten sheets in an act of worship at Conference 2011. The approximate 8000 sheets will then be bound in the summer of 2011 into a number of hard bound volumes, which will be displayed, celebrated and used in various ways throughout the Connexion.

The Gosport and Fareham Circuit has been asked to transcribe Galatians Chapter 1 and Ecclesiastes Chapter 5. Vincent and Sharon Canning have offered to make a frontispiece for Galatians. The special paper was handed to the Circuit two days ago with the request that it is completed by May 7<sup>th</sup> when it will be presented to Synod. Consequently, there is a change to the earlier plans.

The Circuit Fresh Expressions Team, who undertook the responsibility for the completion of this work, has decided to use Fareham Church during Holy Week ,  $18^{th} - 22^{nd}$  April. The Church will be open from 10.00 until 14.00 from Monday to Friday to enable people to visit their Holy Week labyrinth. A table will be set up in the chancel area with all the necessary implements for undertaking this



task. There will also be the chance of colouring a copy of the frontispiece which will be displayed in the Welcome Area at Fareham. They will also be on display at the Circuit Biblefresh Day on Sunday, June 5<sup>th</sup> at Bridgemary Church starting at 14.30 along with a photocopy of our handwritten chapters.

#### EASTER - the Most Joyful Day of the Year

Easter is the most joyful day of the year for Christians. Christ has died for our sins. We are forgiven. Christ has risen! We are redeemed! We can look forward to an eternity in his joy! Hallelujah!

The Good News of Jesus Christ is a message so simple that you can explain it to someone in a few minutes. It is so profound that for the rest of their lives they will be still be 'growing' in their Christian walk with God.

Why does the date move around so much? Because the date of Passover moves around, and according to the biblical account, Easter is tied to the Passover. Passover celebrates the Israelites' exodus from Egypt and it lasts for seven days, from the middle of the Hebrew month of Nisan, which equates to late March or early April.

Sir Isaac Newton was one of the first to use the Hebrew lunar calendar to come up with firm dates for Good Friday: Friday 7 April 30 AD or Friday 3 April, 33 AD, with Easter Day falling two days later. Modern scholars continue to think these the most likely.

Most people will tell you that Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox, which is broadly true. But the precise calculations are complicated and involve something called an 'ecclesiastical full moon', which is not the same as the moon in the sky. The earliest possible date for Easter in the West is 22 March, which last fell in 1818 and won't fall again until 2285. The latest is 25 April, which last happened in 1943 and is next due in 2038.

Why the name, 'Easter'? In almost every European language, the festival's name comes from 'Pesach', the Hebrew word for Passover. The Germanic word 'Easter', however, seems to come from Eostre, a Saxon fertility goddess mentioned by the Venerable Bede. He thought that the Saxons worshipped her in 'Eostur month', but may have confused her with the classical dawn goddesses like Eos and Aurora, whose names mean 'shining in the east'. So Easter might have meant simply 'beginning month' – a good time for starting up again after a long winter.

Finally, why Easter eggs? On one hand, they are an ancient symbol of birth in most European cultures. On the other hand, hens start laying regularly again each Spring. Since eggs were forbidden during Lent, it's easy to see how decorating and eating them became a practical way to celebrate Easter. 13

A church backed campaign has succeeded in convincing retailers to stock The Real Easter Egg, the UK's first and only Fairtrade charity egg to mention Jesus on the box.



Morrison's, Waitrose, Co-op and Booths are to stock a limited 'trial listing' of the Real Easter Egg and sell it in their biggest stores. A number of independent shops and a selection of cathedrals are also stocking The Real Easter Egg. And hundreds of Traidcraft supporters have ordered thousands of eggs on behalf of their communities.

The retail price of The Real Easter Egg is £3.99. It is made from high quality Fairtrade chocolate. Two charities benefit from the sale of the egg: Traidcraft Exchange receives 30 pence from every egg sold and Baby Life-line will receive 10% from Real Easter Egg net profits.

Despite selling over 80 million Easter eggs a year, supermarkets initially turned down The Real Easter Egg, unsure if there was a place for a charity-faith egg in their Easter range. The Rt Revd, Nigel McCulloch, Bishop of Manchester, said; "It is great news that for the first time people will have the chance of buying an Easter egg from a shop that explains the significance of the festival on the box. Through the charitable donation and its Fairtrade chocolate the egg brings to light the Easter themes of hope and

new life. I believe there will be widespread support for the product from the faith community with many others likely to be interested."

Virtual Real Easter Egg hunter:- With demand expected to outstrip supply Google Maps is providing the 'Virtual Real Easter Egg hunter' which allows people to hunt for an independent shop or church in their area where they can buy the Real Easter Egg. Visit www.realeasteregg.co.uk

The old Gospel reading for this Sunday was about the feeding of the 5,000 so it was originally called Refreshment Sunday. This Sunday became linked with family reunions and gatherings and became Mothering Sunday.

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#### HOW TO GET CHILDREN TO EAT MORE VEGETABLES

The National Trust poll of 1,000 children found that 42 percent of 8 to 12 year-olds try to hide the vegetables under other food on their plates. Almost a third throw them in the bin when their parents are not looking. A fifth feed greens to the family dog.



But it seems that more than half of children would indeed risk actually eating a vegetable – if they had grown it themselves. And nearly three quarters of youngster would like to have their own growing space. So, think about it this month. Spring is at hand!

## **ROYAL PROMISES - AND NO ESCAPE CLAUSES!**



Probably not since the marriage of Prince Charles and Lady Diana in 1981 will so many people be watching a Christian wedding ceremony as will doubtless be



watching on April 29th. The future heir to the throne, Prince William, will marry Kate Middleton in Westminster Abbey.

The solemn and moving words of the service will echo around the world: 'to have and to hold, from this day forward; for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part'. As one groom - a lawyer, needless to say - remarked to me, 'Not many escape clauses there!'

The exchanging of rings is equally uncompromising: 'all that I am I give to you, and all that I have I share with you'. All that I am? All that I have? My car, my laptop, my precious handbag . . . and my aching heart? All? It's such a comprehensive word; it leaves nothing outside its limits.

Marriage is, on these terms, the total giving of one person to another, for life. It's both wonderful and awesome. No matter how many weddings you attend, those vows still move you. This is what love, as **God** understands it, is all about. It's not 'I love you and I want you and I'm going to have you' (which is how modern culture sometimes portrays it) but about the



total giving of one human being to another. It mirrors the self-giving love of God as we see it in the life of Jesus - which may be why St Paul compares the love of a husband for his wife to Christ's love for his people (Ephesians 5:25).

You may notice, as the service proceeds, just how often the word 'love' occurs in it. Indeed, the opening words sum it all up: 'God is love, and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them.' This is the great sacrament of love. On April 29th we can - wherever we are - share in its joy.
