


Dear Friends

As I come to write this letter we are entering the season of Advent. Advent, anglicized from the Latin word adventus meaning "coming", is a season observed in many Western Christian churches, a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas. It is the beginning of the liturgical year which commences on Advent Sunday.



Advent then is a time of expectant waiting and preparation. - I know we're all very familiar with waiting - after all, we spend a huge chunk of our lives doing it. We wait for buses and trains and planes and in queues of all sorts. We wait for the results of tests. We wait our turn for an operation.

I have heard that if you live to be seventy years old, you will spend three years of your life just waiting: Waiting in line at the supermarket, waiting at the doctor's office, waiting for lunch to be ready, and so on.

I don't particularly like waiting, do you? I don't like it, but I don't know any



way to avoid it. While we are waiting, life goes on and we must make good use of our time. Perhaps we need to rest and waiting gives us the perfect excuse. More often than not there are other things that we could usefully be doing.

When it comes to Advent the description "expectant waiting and preparation" gives us a clue. Don't just waste your time waiting, but use it to prepare for that which you are waiting for - the celebration of the birth

of our Lord.

Let's use the time to get our minds into focus on what we're celebrating and not just on how! MILL

LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

Dear Friends,

It is easy at Christmas to be lulled into a sense of security – familiar people, familiar places, a familiar story. And yet the Christmas story is disturbing and unpredictable (a chance place of birth and an uncertain future for the Christ child) and deeply uncomfortable (the people of power and those with enough money to have their own beds did not witness the birth of Christ). God came close to us as a homeless, needy baby born in a backstreet, away from the limelight of power, money or fame.

It seems to me that only if we can rediscover a sense of the humble, risky nature of the story of a baby born for us, can we can also find the hope and the spiritual strength needed to live in these times. The American preacher Harry Fosdick wrote in his hymn *God of grace and God of glory* a prayer: "Grant us wisdom, grant us courage for the living of these days". The people in the Christmas story needed wisdom and courage and found them in dreams but also in common sense and making the best of what they had, in angels' messages but also in the solidarity of people in a cowshed wondering and glorifying God together.

At Christmas and New Year we think of times ahead as well as being thankful for what we have received. We face many challenges and opportunities in the year ahead as Methodists, but we have much to be thankful for, and grounds for confidence as we face our future together. As a District, we continue to offer help and support to churches and circuits through our training, development and youth/children's officers. I am also committed to offering support for hard-pressed ministers and lay leaders. But above all, as we think and pray through the Christmas story, we have faith in a God who draws close, in unexpected places, to people at the end of their own human resources. God draws close with love – and with grace and glory for the living of these days.

Editor: Here is a light-hearted version of the history of Father Christmas...

HOW FATHER CHRISTMAS GOT WHERE HE IS TODAY

One person you are bound to run into this Christmas season is Father Christmas. These days he seems to frequent shopping malls and garden centres. If he looks tired, just remember that he has been around a long time, and gone through a lot of transformations.

Father Christmas wasn't always the red-suited, white-bearded star of the retail trade that he is today. He began life as Nicholas, born way back about AD260 in Patara, an important port on the southern coast of what is now Turkey. When his parents died and left him a fortune, Nicholas gave it away to the poor. He became a bishop of the nearby city of Myra, where he almost certainly suffered persecution and imprisonment at the hand of the Roman Emperor Diocletian

Nicholas was a serious theologian: he was a participant at the First Council of Nicaea, which formulated the Creed which we still say today. He even, reportedly, slapped another bishop in a squabble over the exact nature of the Trinity.

Nicholas died in Myra about AD343, but the stories of his generosity and kindness were just beginning. One enduring tale tells of the three girls whom he rescued from certain prostitution by giving them gold for their dowries. When the father confronted him to thank him, Nicholas said he should thank God alone.

In the UK, Nicholas became the basis for Father Christmas, who emerged in Victorian times as a jolly-faced bearded character. Meanwhile, Dutch and German settlers had taken him to America with them as Sinter Klaas and Sankt Nicklas.

It was in America that Nicholas received his final two great breaks into real stardom. The first was when the Rev Clement C Moore, a New York Episcopal minister, turned from his life-work of writing a Hebrew/English lexicon, to write a fun poem for his children one Christmas. His 'The Visit of St Nicholas' is now universally known by its first line: 'T' was the Night Before Christmas'.





From Clement Moore we discovered that St Nicholas is round and pink-cheeked and white-bearded, and that he travels at night with sleigh, reindeer and a sack of toys on his back. It was Clement Moore who also revealed that St Nicholas enters houses down chimneys and fills children's stockings with toys and sweets.

So how did we find out that Father Christmas wears red? That was the US Coca-Cola advertising campaign of 1931, who finally released the latest, up-to-date pictures of Father Christmas: wearing a bright red, fur-trimmed coat and a large belt.

These days, it is good that Father Christmas uses reindeer and doesn't have to pay for petrol. In order to get round all the children in the world on Christmas Eve, he will have to travel 221 million miles at an average speed of 1279 miles a second, 6,395 times the speed of sound. For all those of us who are exhausted just rushing around getting ready for Christmas, that is a sobering thought.



CHRISTMAS LIVE

Sometimes when people tell you a story it doesn't really mean as much as it would if you could see it for yourself. St Francis of Assisi had often preached about that very first Christmas in Bethlehem with the animals round the manger and the baby lying on a bed of straw. But he wanted the story to come alive for his congregation. In the year 1223 he had a brilliant idea and planned a very special surprise for Christmas Eve.

Instead of the sermon in church, Francis led the people to a cave. There, to their amazement, was a manger set out with a doll in it, and all around were real animals who watched while Francis told the old story with a new meaning because people could now see it for themselves. The idea grew each year, soon they used a real baby in the crib (an orphan with no home because someone would then willingly take in the 'Christ-baby'). And still today, churches and homes everywhere put up their cribs and wonder anew at the story of God come down to earth, a child like IIIS.

CHRISTMAS BEADS

A nice present to make for someone you love. Cut strips of paper out of Christmas wrapping paper. Each strip 6" (15 cm) long and 3/4" (2 cm) at the widest part. Cut these strips into long triangle shapes so that the tip of the paper is narrower than the base.

Put widest end of the paper strip onto a knitting needle or pencil and begin to wrap it round itself. When you get close to the end, add a very small dab of glue and press it down. Slide the bead off the knitting needle. Repeat. Let the beads dry. Thread the beads onto string or yarn and then tie to make a necklace. You can also make longer lengths into garlands to decorate the Christmas tree.

Use plain colours or the shiny pages of magazines to make beads for all year round.

NOT A GOOD MOVE?


