THE WAY I SEE IT: Disappointment isn't necessarily the end of it

One day I'd like to write a book entitled "Seemed a Good Idea at the Time" There'd be no shortage of examples, from buying that flash car that wouldn't start on cold mornings, to fruitless wars, busted economic policies and 'Splash!' on television. There is something peculiarly awful about crushing disappointment, the death of dreams, the harsh light of reality exposing the emptiness of our hopes. St Luke captures it well in his Gospel in the brilliant little cameo of the couple (surely Mr and Mrs Cleopas) on their sad walk back to Emmaus on the Sunday after the crucifixion: They



met a stranger on the way, and explained the disappointment on their faces with these words: 'We had hoped that he (Jesus of Nazareth) was the one to redeem Israel.'

The stranger appeared unaware of the dramatic recent events in Jerusalem. Yet when they related the story to him, he treated them as they walked along to a master class in the

Scriptures, demonstrating how the Messiah must indeed suffer before he entered into his glory.

They clearly took to the man, and invited him to stay with them for the night as it was by now getting dark. Joining them for the evening meal, he was invited as their guest to give thanks. He took the bread, broke it, and said the words of blessing. As he did so, they realised who he was - in Luke's words, 'their eyes were opened'. It was Jesus. They were in no doubt. As he 'vanished from their sight' they forgot all about tiredness or the darkness outside, and hurried the seven miles or so back to Jerusalem to share their news with the disciples. Full of it, they burst into the Upper Room - only to find that Simon Peter, too, has seen the

risen Lord. Nevertheless, they told their story - the 'stranger' on the road , the way their hearts 'burned within them' as he explained the Scriptures, and how he had been 'made known to them in the breaking of the bread'.

The road to Emmaus, the road of disappointment and despair, had become the road to joy. In an odd kind of way, it often does. Perhaps only those who have found their hopes cruelly dashed can truly appreciate what it means to have them restored, even if in a different way. They had hoped, and their hopes appeared to have been dashed by the death of Jesus. But 'in the breaking of the bread' they had seen the truth. Jesus their Lord was alive. They had hoped, and now they could hope again.

RESHAPING FOR MISSION - Progress Report

After a lively and, at times, emotional debate the Circuit meeting on 14th February agreed to support the recommendation that will be made by the District Synod to Conference that a new Circuit be formed with effect from 1st September 2013 comprising of all the churches in the present Portsmouth Circuit, Gosport and Fareham Circuit and Petersfield Liphook and Haslemere Circuit. Conference is the only body that can create a new Circuit. Understandable there were some concerns about the size of the proposed new Circuit and the loss of local feel to the church but it was felt that we cannot remain as we are, and this was the best option to ensure Methodism thrives for future

Circuit Meeting also asked the Chair of District to identify Re Jeanette Richardson and Rev Andrew de Ville as co-superintendents of the new Circuit.

Portsmouth Circuit meets on 20th February and Petersfield, Liphook and Haslemere meet on 3rd March to consider similar resolutions to the ones we agreed.

Thus we are beginning to reshape. We have yet to agree a name for the new Circuit and suggestions would be welcome. Please let me have your idea as soon as possible. Once the decisions in principle have been made there is a lot of work still to do to work out the detail.

SINGING THE FAITH – PRESENTATION AND E-BOOK EDITIONS




Methodist Church House is considering the publication of two new editions of *Singing the Faith*. The proposed presentation edition will be a facsimile of the music edition printed on fine, Bible paper, with an imitation leather cover. The intention is that it will be lighter and easier to hold than the Music edition already published.

It will be similar to the presentation edition of *Hymns and Psalms*. The cost is likely to be about £50.

The E-book edition is planned to be words only and in Kindle, Epub (iPad etc.) and eReader (Barnes and Noble) formats and is expected to cost no more than £8.


A POEM FOR PALM SUNDAY

Historians are inviting people to dig up stories about Methodists in their family tree and share them on a new heritage website.

My Primitive Methodist Ancestors (www.myprimitivemethodists.org.uk) provides a space where people can share information about every aspect of Primitive Methodism. The easily-searchable site is part of a community archive network, supported by the Methodist Church and Englesea Brook Museum, and was developed by volunteers. Jill Barber, project Director of the Englesea Brook Museum, explains: "We get hundreds of enquiries every year, from all over the world, from people tracing their family history. Many have no experience of church, but are fascinated to find out more about the faith of their ancestors. Some discover their ancestors were put in prison for preaching in the open air, others became Chartists or trade union leaders, and transformed the lives of working people".

FROM THE DIAL A RIDE TEAM

The team is going to run weekly trips to local destinations for "Tea" on four Wednesdays each month.



The buses are wheelchair accessible and these trips are aimed at people who are pretty well housebound / elderly who would appreciate going out. The trips are on a four week cycle with pick ups in four different parts of the entire Fareham Borough - they go to each person's home to pick up / drop off.

The Dial a Ride service runs 5 days a week for trips to town, the library, Sainsbury's etc and also the Voluntary Car Scheme for medical appointments, surgeries, dentist, leg clinic, QA etc. These details and more can be obtained from the Community Action Team Office in West Street, Fareham (opposite Holy Trinity Church).

GRUMPY OLD MEN AND WOMEN? NOT AT ALL!

There is no need to get grumpy as you get older – in fact most of us grow happier. Those are the findings of a recent study carried out by the University of Warwick. It was found that after the 'mid-life dip' in happiness (which hits you at about 45), many older people reported a greater mental satisfaction with life.

The curious thing is that physical infirmities don't seem to affect this later-life contentment. Researchers suspect it might be due to a mature person's better coping abilities in dealing with hardships, a lowering of overall expectations from life, and a lessening of the pressures of work. It was also found that the most contented people get between 6-8 hours sleep a night; either more or less sleep than that had a negative impact on physical and mental health.

Older Christians, of course, have one wonderful promise from God to lean on if things do get rough: "Even to your old age I am he, and even to grey hairs will I sustain you; I have made you and I will carry you." (Isaiah 46:4).



It's not me; I didn't do it. Is it always someone else when the teacher asks 'who made this mess', or Mum says 'who broke this?' And if we hadn't done it, would we offer to clean up the mess or pay for what is broken out of our pocket money? Even though it wasn't our fault and we hadn't done anything wrong?

FOUR STROKE INDICATORS

During a Garden Barbeque a lady stumbled and fell. She assured everyone that she was fine. Although shaken she went on enjoying herself and drove home at 3.00pm. Later that day her husband telephoned some of his wife's friends and told them that his wife had been taken to the hospital where at 6.30pm she had passed away. She had suffered a stroke.

A Neurologist has stated that the 'trick' was getting the stroke recognised, diagnosed and then medically cared for within three hours. Doctors say a bystander can recognise a stroke by asking **FOUR** simple questions:

- S Ask the individual to **SMILE** Stroke sufferers will have difficulty smiling as the lower lip on one side is affected.
- T Ask the person to **TALK**, repeating a simple sentence, like Chicken Soup Stroke sufferers will have difficulty talking and may slur their words
- **R** Ask the person to **RAISE BOTH ARMS** Stroke sufferers will have a problem lifting one of their arms.
- T Ask the person to Stick out their **TONGUE** Stroke sufferers will have a crooked tongue (it goes to one 32de or the other).

REMEMBER Stroke = S T R & T
