Dear Friends,

You may, or may not be aware, but it's official, I am married to 'Mr Christmas' (not to be confused with Father Christmas who is another person entirely!). No sooner has the end of November been and gone then decorations begin to appear in our house. 'Mr Christmas' tries to be subtle about this but once the Christmas trees (yes, we have more than one) are



down from the loft and gaudy baubles, ornaments and metres of tinsel begin to appear then, of course, everything shouts, that CHRISTMAS IS HERE!!!

But is it? Is it really? The beauty and wonder of the coming of Jesus, the advent of which we have prepared for, stays with us and should remain in our hearts long after turkey and tinsel, for the baby in the manger grew to be the Son of Man who through dying, rising, ascending and Spirit sending, promises to be with us forever.



They have had some spectacular results, attracting over 30 children and adults each time. Below is a report printed in REVIVE a magazine distributed to Uniting Churches in West Australia.



"Our committee is very active and enthusiastic and we follow the programmes as set out in Lucy Moore's Messy Church books. We commence with afternoon tea, followed by up to eight different activities in one hour, based on the chosen theme. We then have a short worship time and reenactment of the Biblical story. This is followed by a delicious meal.

It is such fun. Our first session held in June was on the Good Shepherd which included creative activities involving sheep, and even a demonstration of spinning by Dulcie Read. Then in the Church we built a sheep pen out of sticks and made a sheep collage.

The August session and theme of 'love your neighbour' and story of the good Samaritan, offered plenty of scope from the fun of bandit masks and a bandit cave, to a 'love your neighbour' collage and Friendship Inn and many other activities. The creativity of some of the projects is quite amazing. We are getting ready to move into the Advent programmes and nativity presentations for Christmas".

We wish them well in their endeavours. This shows Messy Church is certainly spreading world wide.



Feast Day 6 December

St Nicholas was the bishop of Myra, in Asia Minor, in the fourth century. Lots of stories are told of his kindness and generosity. He is the patron saint of Russia, children, scholars, merchants and sailors.

One legend tells of his secret gifts to three daughters from a poor family. It is said that he threw 3 purses of gold down the chimney where they landed in the girls' stockings which they had hung up to dry in front of the fire. This is supposed to be the origin of hanging up Christmas stockings.



Over time the name of St Nicholas changed to Sinterklass and thus to Santa Claus in the Christmas celebrations.

STOCKINO DECORATIONS

You will need some Christmascoloured felt, a needle and thread, fabric glue, ribbon and sequins or buttons for decoration.

Fold the felt in half and cut out two simple stocking shapes. Sew these together with a simple running stitch, leaving the top edge open. Sew a loop of ribbon to the top of the stocking.

Now you can decorate the stocking with scraps of felt, lace, buttons or sequins. Glue them on carefully and leave to dry. You could even try writing a name in glue and sprinkling on glitter to cover it.

This would be nice to give as a

present with a little present or sweet inside or to hang on the Christmas tree as a



decoration. You can make them any size you like.

THE SEASON OF CHRISTMAS

You can come with a costume to wear, or a prop to represent your part, or just a hat to wear, if you wish. No one will have to learn any lines-you will have the script in front of you.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 2014

St WULFSTAN 19th January

St Wulfstan was Bishop of Worcester from 1062-95. He lived during the Norman Conquest of England and was the only Saxon bishop to remain under William the Conqueror.

Wulfstan was a caring and hardworking monk. He rebuilt the cathedral at Worcester, cared for the poor, and struggled to ease the harsh conditions imposed by the Normans on the Saxons. Unlike some priests, he baptised children of the poor without charge. It is said that he never turned away people asking for help.

Wulfstan fought the slave trade in Bristol (slave trading didn't just start with slaves from Africa but had been going on for centuries with slaves from England being sold to Ireland and North Africa).

Wulfstan died whilst washing the feet of 12 poor men during a service in the cathedral. He died as he had lived, serving God and caring for others.
