


Dear friends

As the season of Easter draws to a close we are encouraged to continue to think about beginnings and endings, or is that endings and beginnings?! Whichever way round we want to put them, they are both part of the cycle of life and faith.

I feel a bit sorry for the disciples and those who experienced the presence of the risen Christ with them, because no sooner had they revelled in the joy of Jesus' resurrection than he makes it clear that he isn't staying and he's going again to the Father. They were told to wait (again!) for what would happen next as part of God's plan. After Jesus ascended into heaven (Ascension Day is May 14th this year) there was a waiting time before the Spirit came at Pentecost. Our liturgical year says that it is 10 days or so. I wonder if that waiting was a little similar in mood to the shorter time that the disciples had had to wait between Jesus' death and resurrection. On both occasions, Jesus had gone from their sight and they weren't sure what would happen next. Something had ended and a new beginning had been promised but it wasn't here yet. There was an ending and an 'in between' time of waiting. When the Spirit

eventually came at Pentecost, it was a powerful new beginning for those who were now to preach, witness and testify to all that God had done in Jesus Christ his Son. Things were never the same again.

Endings, beginnings and periods of waiting are not always comfortable times. They can be both traumatic and enlightening; making us apprehensive but be exciting as well. Ultimately they

Laying down their lives at Pentecost

As you celebrate Pentecost, pause for a moment to ask yourself one question – how is it that you are standing here, as a Christian, on this day in 2015?

It's because somebody told you about Jesus, right? But who told them? We're all links in a chain that stretches back to Pentecost, when Peter emboldened by the Holy Spirit, first told others about the faith. He, and countless others since, paid the ultimate price, so that you might live. And Christians are still laying down their lives around the world today for their faith. Christians are persecuted under authoritarian states, in communist and post-communist countries, under Hinduism and even under Buddhism

But today, few face persecution more severe than that suffered by Christians under extreme Islam in the countries which first heard the gospel after Pentecost.

At the first Pentecost, 3,000 devout Jews had gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the giving of the Law. They returned to their respective nations bearing an even greater gift – the Gospel, which spread like wildfire.

Yet today, 2,000 years later, that Christian presence is dwindling to the point of extinction.

Take Iraq, ancient Mesopotamia and the birthplace of Abraham, where today Christians are being driven from their land by Islamic State. "Are we seeing the end of Christianity?" asks the Vicar of Baghdad, Canon Andrew White. "We have had people massacred, their heads chopped off. It looks as though the end could be very near."

Further north, in Erbil, Chaldean Archbishop Bashar M Warda, ponders the same question.

"Since 2003, half the Christians have left the country," he says. "The attack has been immense. We were above 1m, now you hardly find 300,000." He, too, fears the exodus of Christians may be unstoppable.

The one beacon of hope is Iraqi Kurdistan, which has flung open its gates to the persecuted, and claims to be the only region in the Middle East where the Christian population is growing. The Kurds understand persecution. They were gassed by Saddam. And these Kurds who are remembering Christians in their hour of need are Muslims.

May our own memories be not so dulled by the freedoms we take for granted that we fail to remember our persecuted Christian family this Pentecost.

Summarised responses to ACM discussion about Holy Communion

At our ACM held on the 1st March 2015 we had a short discussion on the celebration of Holy Communion. See below for the collated responses to the questions that were discussed in small groups

Question One

During the last 18 months in our morning communion services we have used the 'rolling' communion on most occasions with the opportunity to come to/ kneel at the communion rail on 3 occasions per year (Easter, Christmas and Covenant Service).

What do you think about that? Does that feel like a good balance?

The balance is fine.

Like the rolling communion.

Like the variety and different styles.

It's a good mix.

Could 3 occasions be increased to 6 – an alternating pattern of rolling and rail communions?

Once a quarter kneeling at rail, rest of time rolling HC.

More kneeling at the rail HC.

Like kneeling at rail – more personal.

Kneeling at the rail is a more peaceful, spiritual space – an opportunity for prayer and re-dedication.

If time is an issue then we could sing one less hymn.

Those who are physically less able like the opportunity to remain seated.

When communion is at the rail – congregation need to be reminded of the procedure.

There is an element of rush and speed away from the rail.

Should be greater awareness of when to join the queue when led from the back – enabling adequate preparation of personal prayer.

Do not like start at the back – can't see when it is nearly your turn.

Question Two

Are there other ways that we could share HC together that you would like to sug-

Communicants should be encouraged to use either side for wine.

Rows should be split coming forward to keep things going.

Could we have continuous HC but kneeling at the rail?

Could we pass bread and wine from person to person – this may be better

Could we stay in seats – have elements brought to us and eat and drink together?

Some people do not like sharing the peace – best done just at evening Iona service.

I am getting used to sharing the peace.

Question Three

We use a range of liturgy in our communion services (both morning and evening). Sometimes we use the Methodist Worship Book (MWB) and on other occasions, alternative words.

Prefer non-use of MWB

Use variety of HC services in MWB in rotation.

Liked recent shorter liturgy without MWB.

Like Iona style

Like use of alternative words.

Should use MWB in the morning – keep Iona and alternatives to the evening.

We like variety but feel that there should be more conventional communions than other types.

Are there any other comments that you would like to make about the way that we celebrate Holy Communion together?

Occasionally the cubes of bread are too big

Smaller bread please.

How do we cater for allergies with the new legislation? Gluten-free plate?

Children are too young to take the elements – blessing only!

At present it is all pretty efficient.

In summary

Thank you for the open and honest discussion and responses to the questions. As you can see there are a range of opinions and ideas that will be taken forward and considered at the next Worship Consultation meeting to be held on Monday 1st June (all welcome). Any recommendations that this meeting makes will be taken forward to the next Church Council on July 7th. Watch this space, as they say!

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SAFE PASSAGE

Roy Crowder, Partnership Coordinator for Europe, on calls for protection of migrants.

Immigration has been a major political topic since the opening shots were fired in the general election campaign.

However, Churches across Europe are trying to offer a united voice on migration and people movement.

More than 3,400 people died in 2014 crossing the Mediterranean to find refuge. Hundreds have drowned already in 2015.

The Italian Protestant Federation, including the Methodist Church, has established an 'Observatory' on Lampedusa Island, where 366 people drowned in 2013. The staff assist migrants and document the situation.

In 2013 the Italian Navy extended search and rescue operations, saving many lives. But when Italy was left on its own to fund the high cost it could not continue. Nor can Italian Churches address the crisis alone. Europe as a whole must tackle the issues and Churches need to stand together.

The Churches Commission for Migrants in Europe (CCME) addresses these issues. It commemorated the Lampedusa anniversary by calling on EU countries to establish 'safe passage' procedures to protect people.

Catholic, Orthodox and Protestant leaders drafted 'Recommendations for Safe and Legal Paths to Protection' for recognising Protection Status and distributing people fairly. The recommendations point out that EU member states have signed international agreements, such as the Refugee Convention, binding governments to recognise the dignity of those fleeing violence. Refugee resettlement and humanitarian admission could increase with proper coordination. Currently, Germany offers far more places than others.

Across Europe, congregations actively support migrants and asylum seekers, helping them learn their language and navigate officialdom.

As we approach an election where immigration is a contentious issue, church members can ask politicians to make 'Safe and Legal Paths'.

The commission's recommendations can be downloaded at www.ccme.be. Churches can use them to challenge candidates to endorse its contents.
