

Dear friends

I hope that you have had an opportunity for a change of routine and some relaxation over the summer months. As some of you know, this year we spent part of our holiday in London seeing some of the tourist attractions and sights of the capital. One of the places that we visited was the Imperial War Museum. We spent many hours there and still only saw about half of the exhibitions on offer. The most moving experience was to walk around the exhibition that detailed the dreadful events of the Holocaust in which a staggering 11 million people died. Six million were Jews but other groups were targeted too by Hitler and his Nazi regime such as Jehovah's witnesses, homosexuals, people with disabilities and Roma communities.

The exhibition included many first-hand experiences of Jews who had suffered so terribly. One reflection spoken by a Jewish survivor of Auschwitz said 'We need to learn tolerance, celebrate difference and learn to live alongside people of all faiths and none'. And secondly, a quote from Edmund Burke (1729-1797, an Irish political theorist and philosopher) which read 'for evil to triumph it's only necessary for good men to do nothing'. Neither quote really needs much explanation. Both are just as true today as they were at the time they were first expressed and are as relevant to the world in which we live now as they were then. Both also remind us that we have an individual responsibility to work for good and to lead by example. One of the most chilling things about the Holocaust is that, in many ways, it was one man's ideology that began it all. So the reverse is true too. One person's act of kindness; demonstration of tolerance; standing up against an evil can be the catalyst for others to do the same and an inspiration to others to always work for good. The words of Matthew's gospel Ch.25 v31-40 make it very clear that small acts of goodness, kindness and understanding between fellow human beings do not go unnoticed by God because he feels the goodness, kindness and understanding Himself: 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me'.

Steve Wild - President of the Conference

In his inaugural address at the Conference in Southport, the Revd Steve Wild challenged each Methodist church in Britain to aim to bring just one person to faith in the coming year, saying: "Let's take God seriously. I want to help us in the task of evangelism, to put mission on the agenda and give our churches an aim to win a person for Christ."

"We cannot sit back in complacency," he added. "We have a massive kingdom of God task. I'm wanting this year to challenge each church to bring one person to faith - to make one new member this next year, let's make bringing people to faith the main point, we don't do it alone. The unconditional love of Jesus is our motivation."

He told those gathered at the Conference that John Wesley only had ten guineas to his name when he died. Wesley's will directed that four of these guineas should pay four unemployed men to carry his coffin and the remainder be distributed among his poorest preachers.

"What else did he leave behind?" Steve asked. "Changed lives hundreds of them, Christian communities dotted all over this country and in other parts of the world, fellowships seeking to take God seriously. Oh that we may all draw to the foot of the cross and experience this powerful love and make this our legacy one of trans-


