Dear friends, Each of the gospels have their own account of Jesus' resurrection. If I was pushed to express a preference then I think I might go for John's account in Ch.20 of his gospel. In his story Mary Magdalene has a large role. She is a complex character and has often been portrayed as such. We know that her encounter with Jesus during his ministry transformed her life so that she became a determined follower of his. Not only this, but she is the first person in John's gospel who sees the risen Christ and she is the first evangelist for she goes and says 'I have seen the Lord' to the rest of the disciples (even though they don't appear to believe her). Her witness alone proves that resurrection is **for everyone**. The heart of the gospels is about the good news of new life **for all**. For rich and poor; for the respectable and unrespectable; for the have and the have nots; the popular and the unpopular alike.

We might also note that Mary only discovers the resurrection has happened because she openly lingers at the empty tomb longer than anyone else. She is willing to stay peering into the darkness and emptiness for a second time for she is not as fearful of it as the others. It is in her lingering that she is willing to talk to the stranger in her midst – the gardener – and he turns out to be the risen Christ!

During this Easter season we continue to ponder on the resurrection stories and their meaning for us today. As a Circuit we are beginning to engage in conversations about evangelism – the sharing of the good news and talking of God (see elsewhere in this edition for a summary of our discussions at our Annual Church meeting). Sometimes we are called to share and talk with folk who are experiencing an emptiness and fear themselves and we take the opportunity to walk alongside them and linger with them in their difficulties, assuring them of God's presence. The good news is that resurrection is there even in the darkness, often in unexpected places and unexpected people. May God continue to open our eyes to see it as we continue our journey through the Easter season and we continue to talk together and with others about the good news of God. With love, Claire

## Annual Church Meeting 19th March 2017

At this year's ACM we spent a few minutes in small groups reflecting on the nature of our church life together and the aspects of mission that we are involved in. 'Mission' involves both *outreach* and *evangelism* recognising that our priority is to make disciples of Jesus through sharing our faith with others. We looked at the following questions and invited feedback:

- What place and form does evangelism take in the life of our church?
- What (if anything) holds us back?
- What resources or help does our church need to increase the evangelism (faith sharing / talking about Jesus) that is done by people in our church?

Thoughts shared included:

\* Sharing activities with other churches in our area eg an ecumenical youth club

\* many of our activities bring people across the threshold and into the church building so our outreach is good but how do we encourage faith?

\* We can look at the church's activities as involving head, heart and hands

- \* we need to be listening ears \* every welcome we extend to others is important
- \* the image of the evangelist standing on the street corner and shouting about faith is unhelpful!
- \* do we have a lack of confidence in chatting about our faith with others?
- \* how much we share of our faith is a balance

\* social media is increasingly the way that people communicate and a tool for 'marketing/ publicising' what we have to offer

- \* how do we keep hold of young people who grow up and leave their 'home' church?
- \* Messy church attracts families (though maybe not both parents in a working family)
- \* the church is **us**, not the building, and we all have a duty to share God's love
- \* outreach leads to friendship that can then lead to faith sharing
- \* we have an opportunity to reach out to people in times of need.
- \* Prayer is really important in all of this!

Time constraints meant that many of these thoughts are still to be developed and will continue to be discussed at Church Council and other relevant groups in the life of the church. My thanks to everyone who engaged in the discussion at the meeting. Claire
