Dear friends,

I wonder how the Lenten journey is progressing for you? For me, Lent did not begin in the way that I had thought it would! Rather than preparing for Ash Wednesday services and beginning the season with others, I found myself a little more isolated at home in a bit of a 'fog' of vertigo.

What did prove to be timely was that at the beginning of March the latest edition of Magnet was placed into my hands. One of the books reviewed in that edition was 'At home in Lent: An exploration of Lent through 46 household objects'. I ordered it straightaway because I knew that at least for the first part of Lent I was going to be spending more time at home than I had previously thought.

It is proving to be a very interesting book. There are 46 chapters where the author takes a different household item each day (examples are a door, fireplace, mobile phone, mirror, keys...) and beginning with a Bible passage they explore something of the background to each object and consider how it might say something to us on the journey of Lent. I was particularly struck by the chapter on 'Shoes' where the author says:

'Each Lent is a lifetime in miniature. We begin by recognising our sinful nature, which we proceed to regret and repent of. Then... we resolve to repair our lives with the help of God, so that we may be renewed and at the end reach the goal of resurrection life. The journey through the seven R's of Lent is a mini-lifetime,

a condensed rehearsal or spiritual walk-through of the greater life we have.'

I wonder if Lent feels a bit like that for you? May the journeys we are walking at this time of year bear fruit in our lives and remind us of the abundant life that can only be found in Jesus Christ. We journey towards Easter with hope.

During my time so far with the Fareham Team, I have been able to visit Bridgemary, Gosport, Horndean, Lee on the Solent, Portchester and Stubbington Methodist churches multiple times! It's great to travel to other churches and experience some new acts of worship and even better to share ideas, worship together and meet other Methodist Christians.

There is no charge for Messy Church, which is supported by Fareham Methodist Church, although donations are always gratefully received.

Additional new ways of giving

Over the years the 'shape' of the church has changed with a significant amount of outreach, mission and other activity taking place during the week and not always on the church premises.

Currently Fareham Methodist Church receives donations either as cash (generally on a Sunday) or in the form of regular standing order payments. The bulk of the donations comes from Church members and adherents - people who either attend or have attended worship on a Sunday.

This model tends to exclude people who may want to support the activities of the church but who do not attend regularly or perhaps only experience the church through occasional weekday events.

We are increasingly moving towards a cashless society, especially the younger generation. More and more people pay for things using 'contactless' cards or even with their 'Smartphones'. Banks are actively discouraging the use of cheques.

It is not possible for the Church to accept Contactless or Smartphone donations, but it would be possible for the church to receive donations paid through 'Text Giving'. This is generally becoming more frequently used especially for fundraising events or appeals and younger people are more comfortable with this means of donating.

To allow this to happen at Fareham Methodist Church we have set up an arrangement with an organisation called DONR. The system allows the church to receive donations for any amount of 'whole pounds' between £1 and £20. It is currently set up for 'one-off' donations but can be set up for regular giving by Text in due course.

It is important that we publicise this new way of giving so over the next few weeks a series of notices will be displayed, and cards will be available in the building. People might want to donate when they get home so they can just take a card with them.

TEXT Giving is not designed to replace the existing methods of cash, cheque or standing order but to supplement them.

However, if anyone using one of these existing means for donation wants to change to TEXT Giving please contact Mike Petter.

To donate by text, send FMC # to 70085 where # is the amount to be donated between £1 and £20. For example: **FMC 5** sent to **70085** will donate £5 to the Church.

Meeting at Gosport Town Hall re a Pilot CTiG Shelter for the Homeless - Friday 8th March 2019 - 2.00 p.m.

It was a large open meeting organised by Claire Nijjer with representatives from the council, vicars of the churches which may be interested in taking part in the pilot scheme and other charity volunteers. Philip Rutt, from the Fareham and Gosport Basics Bank, was also there with one or two others from Fareham.

Lisa Butler spoke about *The Open Church Project* in Portsmouth. Kevin Gallagher (from Caritas) spoke about the Windsor Homeless Project '*More Than a Shelter*'.

Specific Experience from More than a Shelter:

- 5 churches involved.
- 6 week pilot as a start in order to increase the confidence of volunteers in dealing with the homeless.
- Up to 15 guests per night (the maximum number is dictated by the smallest church hall) this is a good number for building relationships with the volunteers.

General Advice:

Relationships/engagement with the volunteers are key as this is a clear window of opportunity for guests to reflect on their situations in comfort and then to take some steps to move forward in their process of recovery.

The shelter is "home" for the guests for the duration of the term - they are treated as people - with respect and care.

No proselytising.

- 3 shifts of c4 volunteers needed per day evening (at least 4), night, morning.
- 2 meals provided breakfast, 2 or 3 course supper volunteers and guests eat together.
- Teams of volunteers are organised by each church involved rather than by one central co-ordinator.

It takes around 25 policies to run a multi-site shelter.

The National Society for the Homeless, 'Housing Justice', is there to give help and advice.

Volunteers do <u>not</u> need DBS checks for working with the homeless as there is no lone working and no one-to-one advice is given.

Guests are referred by agencies etc. There are no walks-in. There is a strict code of conduct - no alcohol, no drugs, no weapons - and a curfew.

It is recommended that a name be given to the Shelter and that a Facebook Page be set up quickly to attract volunteers/funding etc.

There needs to be a project co-ordinator who can get churches signed up, form a steering group of 5-6 people, and work with Caritas.

The lead time is about 6 months.

Volunteers can come through churches but also *Community First* and *One Community* - there is a desire to get involved in the general public as well as amongst Christians.

Funding comes from churches but can also approach the Council, supermarkets and Caritas.

If one decides to employ a shelter night manager (as volunteers for the night shift are harder to recruit) there will be a need to fund raise for that.

I am hoping to get a copy of the *PowerPoint* they showed at the meeting. If I receive this, I will pass it on to you.

Hope this is helpful for our thinking!

Points on How to Keep Safe (Submitted by Bobby Watson via an original from Erica Sheets)

Everyone should take five minutes to read this. It may save your life or a loved one's life. In daylight hours, refresh yourself of these things to do in an emergency situation. This is for you, and for you to share. After reading these nine crucial tips, forward them to someone you care about. It never hurts to be careful.

- 1. Tip from Tae Kwon Do: The elbow is the strongest point on your body. If you are close enough to use it, do so!
- 2. Learned this from a tourist guide: If a robber asks for your wallet and/or purse **DO NOT HAND IT OVER.** Toss it away from you... Chances are that (s)he is more interested in your wallet and/or purse than you, and (s)he will go for the wallet/purse. **RUN LIKE MAD IN THE OTHER DIRECTION!**
- 3. If you are ever thrown into the boot of a car, kick out the back tail lights and stick your arm out of the hole and start waving like crazy. The driver won't see you, but everybody else will. This has saved lives.
- 4. Women have a tendency to get into their cars after shopping, eating, working, etc., and just sit (doing their cheque book, or making a list, etc.). DON'T DO THIS! The predator will be watching you, and this is the perfect opportunity for him/her to get in on the passenger side, put a gun to your HEAD and tell you where to go. AS SOON AS YOU GET INTO YOUR CAR, LOCK THE DOORS AND LEAVE. If someone is in the car with a gun to your head DO NOT DRIVE OFF... Repeat: DO NOT DRIVE OFF! Instead 'gun' the engine and speed into anything, wrecking the car. Your Air Bag will save you. If the person is in the back seat they will get the worst of the collision. As soon as the car crashes... BAIL OUT AND RUN! It is better than having your body found in a remote location.
- 5. A few notes about getting into your car in a car park or garage:
- **a. BE AWARE** look around you, look into your car, at the passenger side floor and in the back seat.
- **b.** If you are parked next to a big van, enter your car from the passenger door. Most serial killers attack their victims by pulling them into their vans while the women are attempting to get into their cars.
- **c.** Look at the cars parked on both the driver's side of your vehicle and the passengers' side. If a male is sitting alone in the seat nearest to your car you may want to walk back into the shopping mall, or your work place and get a guard/policeman to walk you back out.

IT IS ALWAYS BETTER TO BE SAFE THAN SORRY - and better to be paranoid than dead.

- 6. **ALWAYS** take the lift instead of the stairs. Stairwells are dangerous places in which to be alone and a perfect crime spot. This is especially true at **NIGHT**!
- 7. If the predator has a gun and you are not under his/her control **ALWAYS RUN!** The predator will only hit you, a running target, 4 in 100 times. Even then the hit most likely **WILL NOT** be a vital organ. **RUN preferably in a zig zag pattern if at all possible!**
- 8. Women tend always to be sympathetic: **STOP!** You may get raped or killed. Example: a serial killer who was a good-looking, well educated man **ALWAYS** played on the sympathies of unsuspecting women. Tears welled up in my eyes, and a heart that had almost forgotten how to love opened wide. I took

Wendy's mother in my arms. "I'm sorry, I'm sorry, I'm so sorry," I muttered over and over, and we wept together. The precious little picture is framed now and hangs in my study. Six words, one for each year of her life, that speak to me of inner harmony, courage and undemanding love. A gift from a child with sea-blue eyes and hair the colour of sand who taught me the gift of love.
