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READING: Mark 8:31-38

Then Jesus began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.'

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

SERMON

A quick recap on the history of God's people from Abraham up to the point of that gospel reading. I promise, very quick – probably too quick but it helps us understand what this is all about.

Abraham, the human 'father of many nations,' lived in a pagan world of many gods but he was open to the One Creator and came into a covenant relationship with Yahweh – the Lord. Abraham's descendants were chosen to be a people through whom all the world would be blessed. Later the guiding principles of the Law were given through Moses. By the time Jesus came on the scene, Judaism was well established and minutely organised. But God had been privatised and the bit about the world side-lined. There must have been many who did maintain that loving relationship with God, but it seems the powerful hierarchy were more interested in administering the Law, which had tended to smother relationship.

Perhaps when Jesus started his ministry, he hoped that the religious authorities – the theologians – might recognise him. But he quickly realised that this was not going to happen. They already had their pattern for the Messiah they expected. Although implicit in some prophetic writings, particularly those relating to Isaiah's Suffering Servant, Jesus's revolutionary understanding of power was in direct opposition to the human understanding of power.

That's the central point today: the Power of Love versus the love of power.

Just before today's passage Peter has recognised Jesus as Messiah. But, similarly to the theologians, Peter has his own understanding of what being Messiah involved. And it didn't include getting crucified.

We read Jesus's reaction to Peter's rebuke. This echoes the temptations which were all about human ideas of power, and which he had rejected, choosing instead to make Love work.

You don't need to have heard or read much Church history to come to the conclusion that the Church has tended more towards Peter's ideas of power than those of Jesus. But there have always been people who have understood, often at great cost, and got it right.

This gospel reading is painful because it points out that following Jesus isn't easy and Jesus never said it would be – rather the contrary. Jesus is simply and devastatingly honest: God's Kingdom of Love comes at a terrible cost. Because we are familiar with it, we often gloss over the barbarous brutality of that ghastly image of carrying your cross.

What Jesus saw clearly was the sad fact that it was not the pagan power of Rome but the religious elite – the good Church people of Jesus's day – who manipulated a foreign death sentence to get rid of the one person who had demonstrated how their God wanted his chosen people to live. The original 'relationship' of Covenant Love and trust had got lost in a power-driven legalism.

The love of power or the Power of Love?

The Church confesses faith as readily as Peter did but we are also the heirs of his misunderstanding. His faith was rightly placed in Jesus, who was and is the true Rock, the Cornerstone on which the Kingdom is built. 'Christ is made the sure foundation.' We shuffle along, wanting to do things the Jesus way but we still cling to our trust in the world's accepted pathways to power.

There are innumerable examples of people who have risked the Jesus way, often involving great suffering. One which reached the world stage was the 'Truth and Reconciliation Commission' in South Africa. When Nelson Mandela emerged from 27 years in prison many expected a blood bath. Instead, with Bishop Desmond Tutu, a new thing happened. Violent enemies were facing each other, saying sorry for atrocities, and offering forgiveness; and things were able to move forward for a little while. It can be done, but Jesus's stark message is still that it is costly.

The pandemic has thrust the Church out of buildings and out of comfort zones. New ways have emerged. We are out in the marketplace – thew digital marketplace – and environments where we are neither comfortable nor familiar with. We are seen alongside and compared with power-mongers, fake news and commerce.

But the message is the same: the Kingdom for which we are made is not built on the love of power but on the Power of Love.

Stories of love in action emerge often from non-Christian sources. The Spirit works where there are those who allow and enable the work of the Kingdom of Love. There are Scribes and Pharisees alive and well in the Church today who are far more interested in ticking boxes than in risking the Jesus way. There are many who have been badly hurt by Church people.

God works through people who are willing to let love in. Whether or not they are signed-up Christians doesn't seem to bother God. Perhaps there will be some surprises in heaven as new arrivals exclaim, 'Was it you all the time and I didn't realise?'

In the meantime, thank God for the Church, Christ's body on earth; and thank God that, in spite of all our mistakes, the world belongs to God and our job as his family is to bear the family likeness.
